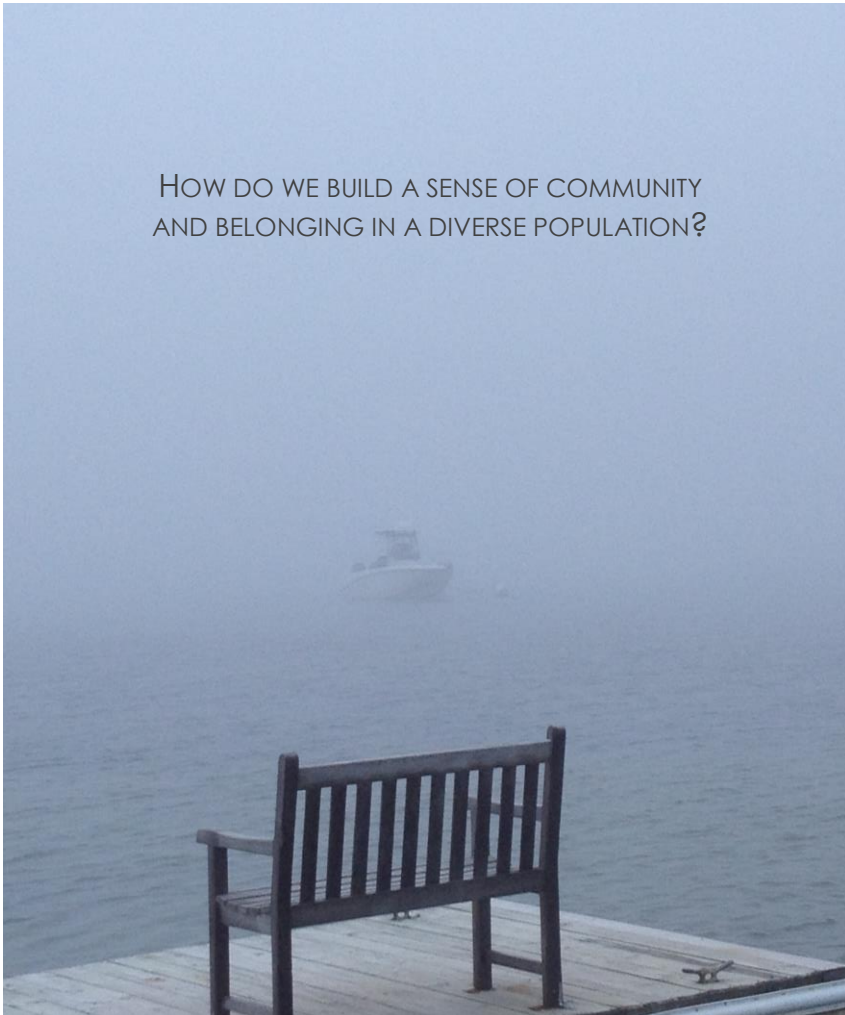


HOW DO WE BUILD A SENSE OF COMMUNITY AND BELONGING IN A DIVERSE POPULATION?
